# Attendance

Five full-day workshops were held at five different locations (Chilham, Ashford, Rainham, Gravesend and East Malling).

In total, 200 people attended, representing 137 different organisations, bodies, affiliations etc.



# Sectors attending

All but the health sector has been represented across the four workshops, with community (friends of group, community groups, recorders and parish/town councils) the sector with the highest attendance (in total and at all but one workshop). There has been good representation from conservation NGOs, local government and farming/land management.

Infrastructure, recreation and access, academia and education, business and commercial and marine had the lowest representation.

#### Common themes on what worked well

# Organisation and facilitation

- ✓ Workshops were well organised.

- ✓ Facilitators were well prepared, well briefed and enabling.

# Format of workshops

- ☑ The format/programme allowed good time for discussion during the two workshop sessions very productive.
- ☑ The small groups for the workshops put people at ease to make suggestions and comments and therefore allowed participation from everyone everyone had a say.
- ☑ Was good to mix people up so there was a diversity of views amongst the group.
- ☑ Workshop sessions allowing time to think and capture ideas, followed by facilitated discussion.
- ✓ Capturing thoughts on notes so everything was recorded.
- ☑ Feedback after workshop sessions was welcomed.

- Provide further examples of the sorts of things we're after, in terms of priorities and potential measures; and the ambitions, in terms of example visionary landscape wide plans/initiatives.

# Format of workshops

- ∠ Limit lunch break to 1 hour.
- Aim for a shorter day.

- Involvement of businesses.

# Location, venue and catering

More veggie and vegan options – some suggestions all food should be non-meat and/or food of local origin.

#### Lessons learnt

### Organisation and facilitation

- \* Don't rely on people to have attended online briefings, watched recordings or read -preworkshop information—always provide a relatively detailed introduction to project.
- \* Ensure introduction and/or briefing brings everyone to same place of understanding.
- \* Ensure sufficient time for Q&A.
- \* Make sure Delivery Group, Board, Supporting Authorities Group and Technical Advisory Groups are sharing details with their networks etc.
- \* Strong facilitation is appreciated comes from good preparation and through briefing.
- \* Within process share examples of successful and visionary landscape wide plans/initiatives.
- **★** Offer outputs in different formats not just online.

# Format of workshops

- \* Keep workshops sessions simple and easy to understand; do not have too many tasks.
- **★** During workshop sessions, have slide up to remind of task.
- \* Ensure a mix of participants in breakout groups.
- \* Allow sufficient time for both workshop and networking.
- \* Shorter workshops so not such a commitment on attendees.

\* After all workshops, review attending sectors and look at who we need to better target next time.

# Location, venue and catering

- ★ Venue is important needs to be sufficiently spacious; well-ventilated and heated; comfortable; and with good audio and visual.
- \* Good and hearty lunches are appreciated.
- \* Seek a balance between natural settings and public transport options.








Making Space for Nature Workshop at Riverside Country Park
